**Shade Sails** – The contracted engineer is finalising plans to place 2 x shade sails projects into the school environment. The first will be a 4 sail project the full length of the old undercover area, out the 6m to the edge of the concrete apron and at its highest point will be 4m. The impressive project will be in our very bright faction colours of blue, green, red and yellow. The other shade sail will be erected over the new nature play area in the Early Years playground.

It is likely to be bright lime green and purple. These shade projects will add colour and improved safety for our school community.

## **Deputy's Desk - Curriculum**

#### **Brightpath**

This term our Kindy and Pre-Primary Students have been learning about the Recount writing Genre. They have been learning about how to write, how to write a recount and the different parts that make up a recount. There are some great examples in the **K/PP News** later in this newsletter that shows how well they are writing already.

Our Year 1-6 students have been learning about writing Information Reports. They have been learning about the different sections in an Information report, writing Introductions and Conclusions and learning how to research the information for their reports. Many of the classes are combining this with their reading and HASS programs so that students are learning the skills across all learning areas. Learning how to write in paragraphs is one of the key skills these students are learning as part of their Brightpath focus.

All students will be preparing for their final writing assessment for Information Reports and teachers will be able to compare this with their initial writing assessment and view the progress students have made.

### **Swimming Lessons – Seniors**

Our Year 4-6 Students will be engaged in swimming lessons in Weeks 2 and 3 next term, culminating in our Swimming Carnival on Friday 1<sup>st</sup> November. A permission note will be sent home later this week for parents to complete by **Friday 13<sup>th</sup> September**. Once all the permission notes have been returned, a Swimming Lesson Enrolment Form will then be sent home to complete. 
### Years 1/2 POL News

#### Year 5 Room 10

Currently in Room 11, students have been researching facts and information regarding South America, including climate, countries, natural vegetation, landforms (rivers, lakes, mountains), surrounding continents, oceans and seas, and native animals. In the following Geography lessons, they will observe, research and discuss how these natural features influence human activities and the built features (manmade) of places.



### **Specialist POL News - Art**

Students from throughout the school have been working diligently to produce an array of wonderful artwork. Some of which will be on display in the upcoming Esperance Wildflower Festival Art Exhibition and Competition. Artworks will be on display at the Anglican Church behind the Parish Centre from Tuesday 24<sup>th</sup> until Saturday 28th September.

The year 6 students have been looking into the works of Hokusai and his most notable artwork the Great Wave. They are now beginning to look into producing a powerful piece of pop art.

The year 5's and middle school students have used mixed media, including edicol dye, watercolour, crayon, coloured pencil and a black texta to produce brightly coloured gum leaf designs. The year 5's are now working on their pop art while many of the other classes will begin working on clay projects.

The junior school classes have been exploring leaf printing and working with clay to make amazingly colourful bug fossils. They are currently working on their Gerald the Giraffe paintings, from the story "Giraffes Can't Dance'.
