Dear parents and carers

As we draw close to the end of Semester One, after a very busy eleven-week Term 2, it is lovely to pause and reflect on the first half of 2026. Our students have been actively engaged in their learning, training hard and achieving success in sporting endeavours, and participating in excursions throughout our community. Every time our students leave the school grounds, there is always a hope that things will go smoothly and everyone will return safely. Time and again, our students make us proud through the way they represent our school, demonstrating respect, responsibility and pride in all that they do.

Recently, our Year 4 students participated in the Community Reconciliation Walk, while our Year 6 students visited ESHS as part of their transition to high school. 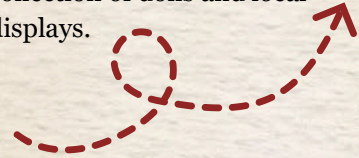
# JUNIOR HISTORY EXCURSION

With rain forecast throughout the day, we were delighted that the weather held off, with only a light drizzle beginning just as the ribbon was cut and the assembly concluded.

The celebration featured a wonderful mix of speeches, musical performances, special guests and the return of several former Principals, including both retired and current Principals on leave. Our School Captains, Amelia and Morgan, confidently led the assembly, demonstrating outstanding leadership throughout the event.

Students from Room 1 and Room 2 delighted the audience with an encore performance of their much-loved assembly item, Happy Birthday Castletown. Mrs Fetherston reflected on the rich history of our school, celebrating 60 years of growth and achievement. The official ribbon-cutting ceremony was conducted by Mrs Behsman, alongside P&C President Karrina Gordon and parent Fiona Ryan, marking an exciting new chapter for our school community.

Following the assembly, students enjoyed a fruit cup while guests and family members gathered in the library for afternoon tea and fellowship.

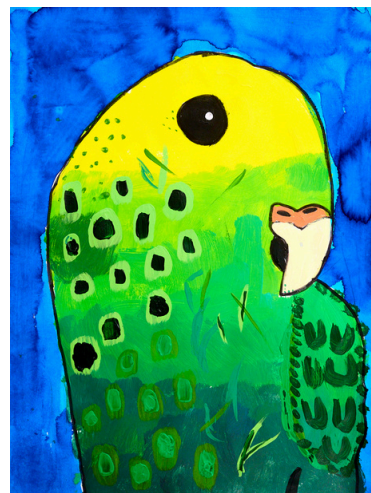


Rooms 9, 10 and 11 drew self-portraits, inspired by Pop Artist, Roy Lichtenstein.

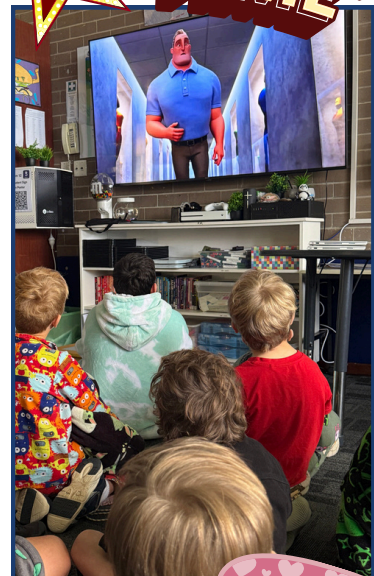
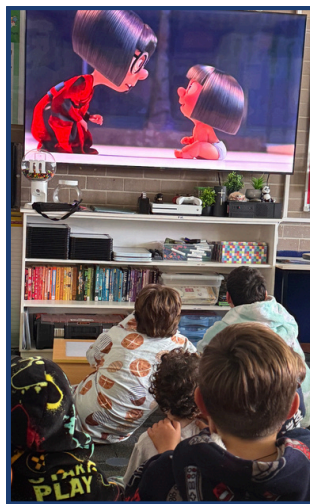
Rooms 13 and 14 used a landscape orientation for their Britto inspired portraits, drawing a more childlike, smaller face.
