Dear Parents and Carers

The weeks are speeding by! This weekend sees the shortest day of the year, and longest night, and from there on the days actually get longer – although the weather will probably get more wintery! I have learnt that these beautiful sunny days we have seen recently are not popular with most people here however, as the rain is needed.

Around the school, things are getting much brighter. The building works around the main quad and Rooms 1 to 8 have now been completed, and this area looks fantastic. Well done to Drake-Brockman Building. I must also acknowledge the patience and flexibility of our staff and students, who have had to move out of their classrooms for about a week. I have not heard one complaint from anyone. The results have certainly been worth the wait.

We continue to creep back toward full "normality" in our school operations. Social distancing is still required under government guidelines, and we can only hold indoor gatherings of 100 people maximum, meaning we can't yet hold discos and assemblies. Parents are still following the roster for coming into the school for pick-up and drop-off, unless you have an urgent need to come into the school for some reason – if so, please come via the office.

Holiday Requests: Now that the intra-state borders are open, many families will be keen to hit the road and get away. In some cases, due to work-related reasons, the holiday may need to be taken in school time. I hope all parents will consider the effect of children missing time at school on their learning, as they are sure to miss out on some skills and content being covered, and absences should only be taken where absolutely necessary.

Under the School Education Act, if a holiday involves an absence of more than two days in school time, a request for permission must be made to the school's principal. maintaining fitness during the Covid-19 isolation, whilst retaining social distancing (obviously you can't get too close to others when skipping!). We also thank our parents and families for encouraging your children to participate, and of course supporting the fund-raising aspect.

Semester 1 Reports

Our Semester 1 reports will be sent home via email on the last day of term – **Friday 3**rd **July**. Please ensure we have your current email address. The link in the email remains active only for 4 weeks so parents are encouraged to download a copy of the report to their device. 
